Only Hire In Once (OHIO): Training Successful Peer Tutors into Academic CoachesJered Wasburn-Moses, Robin Theobald, and Wanda Crawford | Northern Kentucky University

Mt. Storm

Peer academic coaching programs are an increasingly common resource in institutions' efforts to improve retention. Training for these peer coaches is essential. At Northern Kentucky University, peer coaches are experienced tutors and writing consultants who have received additional training relevant to this new role.

In this session, the presenters will provide a detailed description of the NKU program. They will focus especially on the training curriculum: its structure, content, and delivery. They will conclude by identifying challenges in program implementation and delivery, as well as future directions.

GRE Prep - A Learning Center Approach

Lance Williams and Angela Messenger | Youngstown State University *Mt. Adams*

Presenters from Youngstown State University will discuss goals, methods, and evaluation of a pilot workshop series on the GRE – general test. The Mathematics Assistance Center Coordinator and the Writing Center Coordinator will refresh attendees' knowledge of the GRE – general test. They will provide an outline of the prep program and online resources and offer best practices for how to implement a similar program, including guiding test takers from preparation to assistance with interpreting scores. They will suggest additional academic support services for GRE preparation and discuss plans for further development.

Assessing the Impact of Tutoring on Student Success

Do you assess outcomes for students who use your learning center? In this session, the presenter will demonstrate how this is done at Youngstown State University's Center for Student Progress. The presenter will focus most specifically on the tutoring center and how student utilization and performance are assessed, how those results are shared, and why this is so important.

Concurrent Session 2

SpringForward: Lessons from Designing a New Academic Recovery Program

Dr. Lauren Hensley | The Ohio State University *Mt. Storm*

In summer 2016, The Ohio State University's Academic Recovery Workgroup was tasked with developing a 2017 intervention program to increase retention for in-state, new first-year students who struggled during their first semester. In this session, we will discuss the program's development and describe its two major components: a spring course and a summer residential program. We will share lessons learned from the process of designing this new program, as well as qualitative and quantitative outcomes. We will discuss how these insights inspired changes for year two of the program and continue to guide our thinking about academic recovery.

Developing Teamwork between academic assistance and the Athletic Department

Sherry Taylor | Ohio Christian University *Mt. Adams*

The presenter will explore the dynamics between the providers of academic assistance on campus with the athletic goals and schedule conflicts. Propose options for fostering stronger relationships and programs that align the goals of the student, the coaching staff and academic services. This presentation will provide tested strategies and tools for working alongside the athletic director to increase low athlete GPAs.

Improving Student Attendance Policy Compliance in the Learning Center

Elizabeth Fallon | Ball State University

Mt. Washington

Students who regularly attend tutoring meet their academic goals. However, students with weekly tutoring appointments do not always attend regularly. This session will introduce a performance improvement framework and provide examples of how specific interventions can lead to continuously improving student attendance rates at your learning center.

Concurrent Session 3

Experimenting with Study Strategies: Putting Theory to Practice

Susan Fletcher | Ohio University

Mt. Storm

As learning center or FYE instructors, we can struggle with students who nod in agreement to our suggestions, but never put into practice the needed strategies. The presenter will share a summative project for a study strategies course in which students design and conduct their own experiment to test their adoption of a specific study strategy. Using experimental design, intentional data gathering, and lab report formatting, students are forced to try on a specific strategy and test its efficacy for their particular needs. The results almost always surprise them and bring some fruitful metacognitive analysis.

Surprising Advising: Exploring the Relationship Between Academic Advising and the Learning Center

While virtually all learning centers focus on providing academic support, it is less common for such offices to also perform academic advising for students. In the Rinella Learning Center at Miami University, however, professional staff are tasked with providing academic advising to a select student population. Drawing upon the experiences of Rinella Learning Center staff, this presentation will attempt to answer the questions: what happens when learning center professionals are asked to become academic advisors, and how does this crossover allow them to think differently about both the academic advising and academic support fields?

Defining Tutoring in Three Words: Socratic, Heuristic, Maieutic


Amy Spencer and Allen Williams | Ohio Dominican University *Mt. Washington*

In this session, the presenters will demonstrate one of our foundational tutor training sessions, in which we stress the importance of questioning, exploration, and independence in promoting learning. In this interactive session, participants will play the role of new tutors-in-training to experience "hands-on" the meaning of the terms Socratic, heuristic, and maieutic, and how to apply these principles in their work with students. In addition, we will provide connections to research and best practice in the field of learning assistance, as well as information on how our training meets requirements for program certification through CRLA (College Reading & Learning Association).


Taft's Ale House 1429 Race St. Cincinnati, OH 45202

- 3. parking garage near the restaurant


